### Twelve Ways to Increase Participation in *Connect with Kids*

- 1) Watch The Kansas City Channel to see *Connect with Kids* half-hour specials. These programs are designed for parents to watch with their children. After viewing, you'll have the perfect opportunity to discuss a relevant topic with your child.
- 2) Tell your neighbors, friends, family, members of your church or synagogue – everyone you meet! – about the programs in advance and encourage them to watch, too.
- 3) Attend your local PTA meeting to discuss the *Connect with Kids* program.
- 4) Write brief overview articles about the program and submit them to community and organization newsletters. Relate your article to the purpose of the organization. For instance, write an article on civility or cooperation for submission to a Little League newsletter. - 5) Sign up at [connectwithkids.com/kmbc](http://connectwithkids.com/kmbc) to receive advance notification of *Connect with Kids* specials.
- 6) Tell fellow members of local civic groups about the initiative and the shows on television.
- 7) Ask teachers, counselors and principals about their participation in the *Connect with Kids* program. Contact not only the school your child attends, but also other schools in your neighborhood.
- 8) Volunteer to help a teacher with lessons currently underway. You can assist in your own child's class or even one at a nearby school. Use this time to relate personal stories about the character trait being discussed. Give real life examples of those you know who have demonstrated these traits.
- 9) Read the weekly parent tip sheets and take the family quiz at [connectwithkids.com/kmbc](http://connectwithkids.com/kmbc).
- 10) Refer friends to *Connect with Kids* online opportunities by sending group emails about the content.
